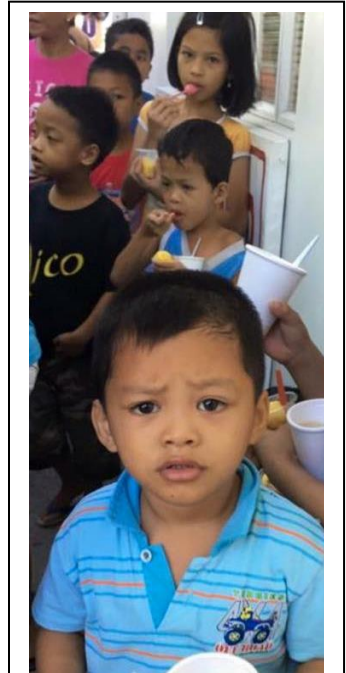

- listing of your club's efforts in the Quota International Annual Report and on the website.

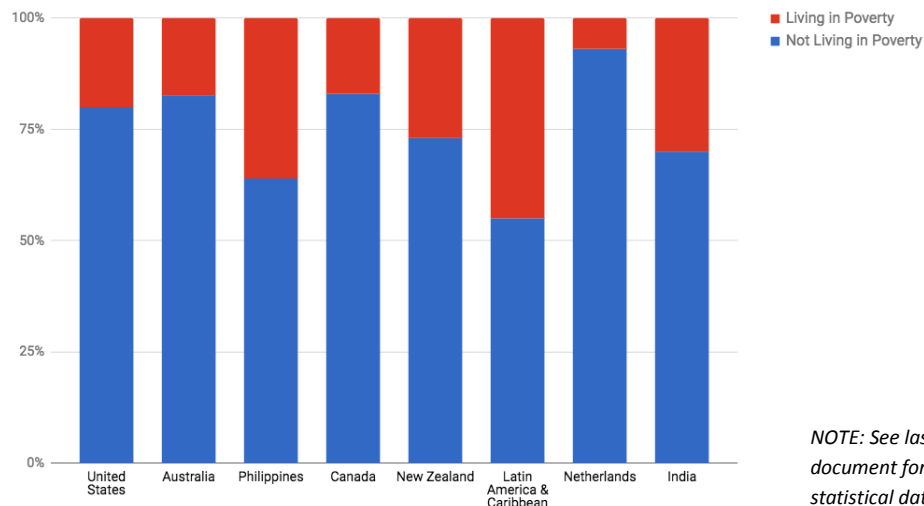

Where to give: Public schools & libraries, Private schools, Schools for the deaf and blind, Orphanages, Hospitals & Medical Centers, Community Centers and Learning Centers, Food Pantries, Abuse Shelters, and Youth and Family Homeless Shelters, Youth Off the Streets.

Deaf & Blind Schools:¹⁰ United States (87), Australia (2), Netherlands (6), Malaysia (1), Canada (9), New Zealand (2), India (4)

Statistical Data & Sources:

- United States: 11 million children, 20% of all children, were living below the federal poverty line during the 2013-2014 school year.¹
- Australia: 731,000 children or 17.4% of all children were living in poverty in 2016.²
- Philippines: 13.4 million children or 36% of all children were living in poverty in 2009.³
- Canada: 1.2 million or 17% of all children were living in poverty in 2015.⁴
- New Zealand: 290,000 children or 27% of all children lived in poverty in 2017.⁵
- Latin America and Caribbean: 81 million children or 45% of all children were living in poverty in 2011.⁶
- Netherlands: 125,000 children or 7% of all children live in long-term poverty.⁷
- India: 115 million children or 30% of all children live in extreme poverty.⁸

- In US schools, 1,260,721 homeless children were enrolled in 2013-2014.⁹
